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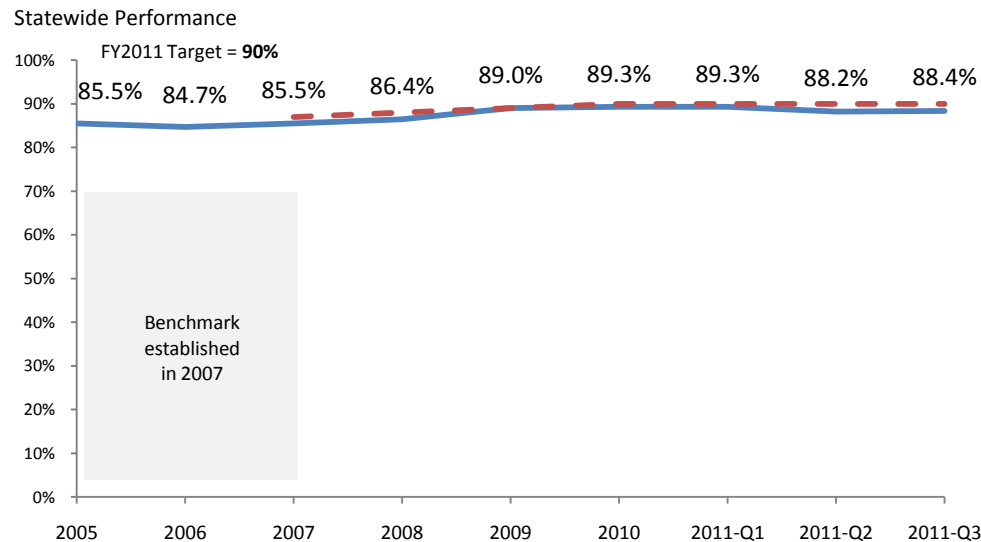

Placement Stability - Two or Fewer Placements

The percentage of children who experience two or fewer placements during their current out-of-home care episode will increase (outcome measure based on percentage of youth entering care during the two previous fiscal years with 2 or fewer placements, with time in care specifications based on entry year). (Placement Stability, Goal 1, Outcome 2)



SUMMARY

- 88.4% of children entering out of home care experienced two or fewer placements during their time in care.
- Performance shows incremental improvement during the past four years. This quarter CA is within 2% of meeting the 90% benchmark.
- Regions 4 and 5 met the benchmark for FY2011-Q3.
- Placement stability and continuity is important for children's personal development and achievement.
- Children who experience a change in placement may be moving into relative care, an adoptive home, or other setting to complete their permanent plan.
- Social workers use Family Team Decision Making (FTDM) meetings when making placement decisions and to help prevent a child's placement from disrupting.
- When a child's case plan is submitted to court and a new placement or change in placement is recommended CA is required to submit supporting documents relevant to the recommendation.

ACTION PLAN

- Strengthen understanding of placement mobility in Washington state, including feasibility of Partners for Our Children (POC) updating the results of their recently published study and providing additional analysis to inform policy and practice decisions.
- Strengthen use and effectiveness of FTDM meetings with assistance from the Annie E. Casey Foundation.
- Increase supports for relative caregivers.
- Revise minimum licensing standards so rules are easily understood and provide flexibility in meeting standards while assuring child safety.
- Implement new practice to develop a support plan with caregivers when placing children in their care based on the needs of the child, placement of a sibling group, or a newly licensed foster home.

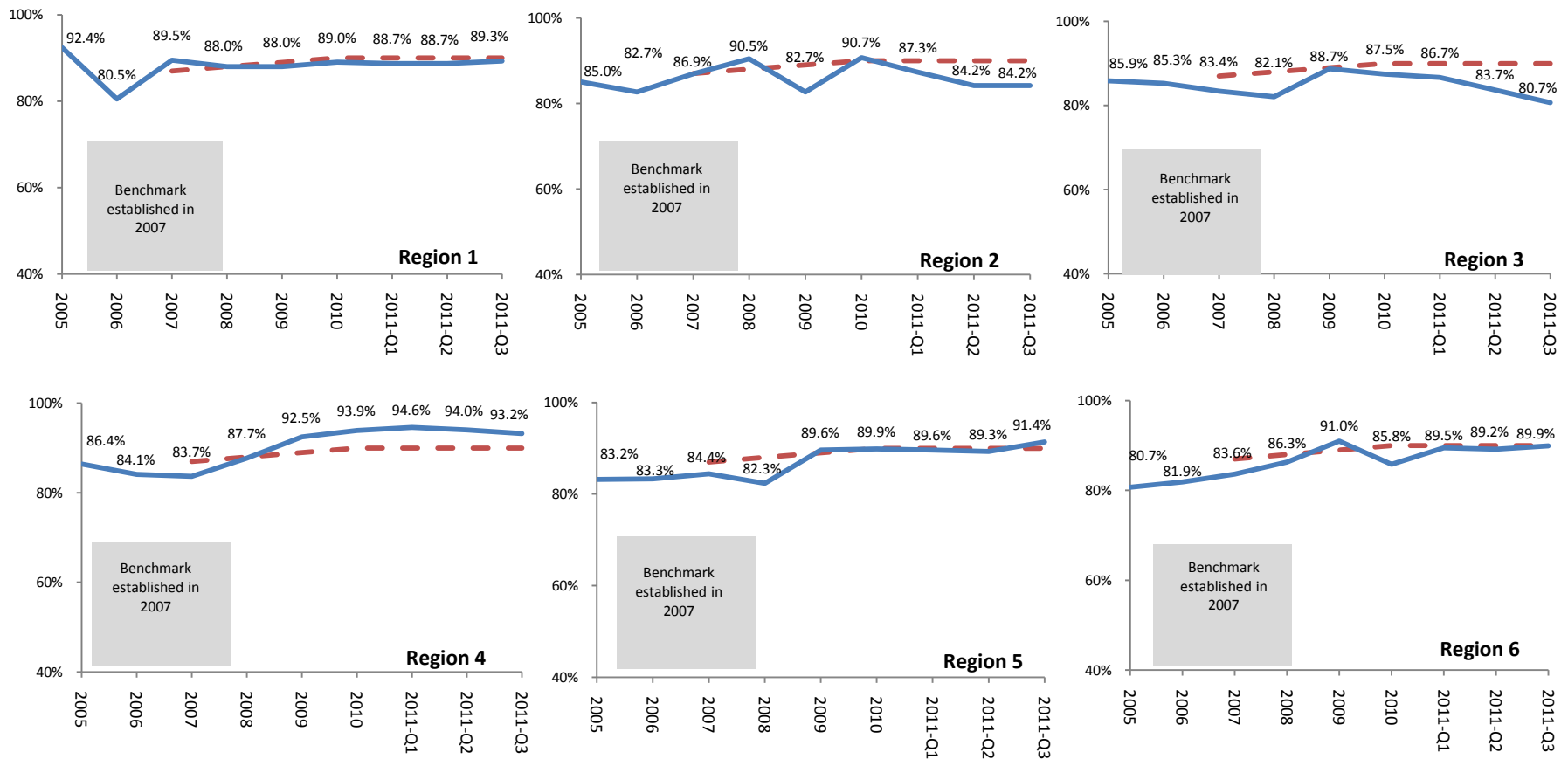

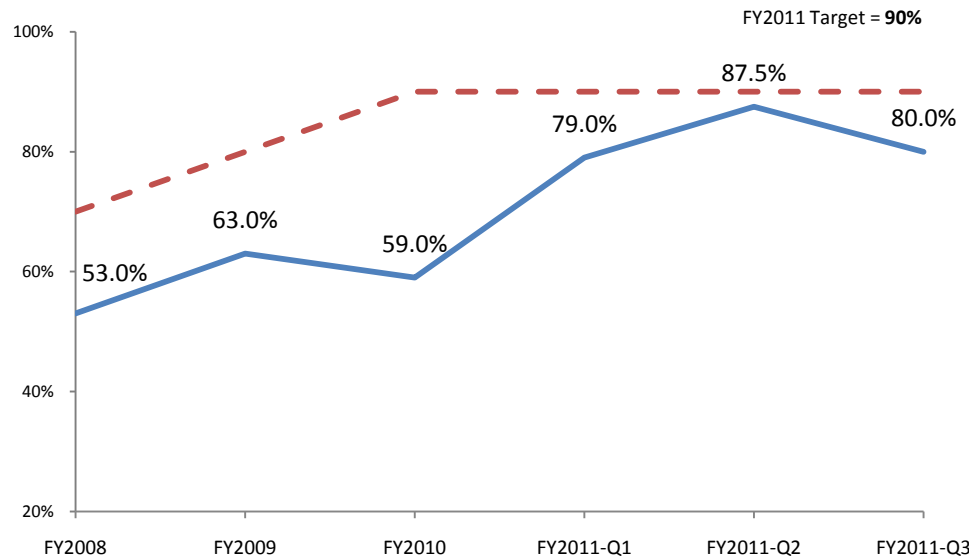

Health and Education Plans Updated in ISSP every 6 Months

Children in out of home care will have health and education plans in their ISSP's updated every six months. (Mental Health, Goal 2, Outcome 2)

Statewide Performance



SUMMARY

- Performance was 80% for the third quarter of 2011 for having updated Health and Education Plans in children’s Individual Safety and Service Plans (ISSP).
- The number of applicable cases used to measure performance on this outcome was limited to 25 cases from three offices during FY2011-Q3.
- During FY2011-Q3, Regions 1, 4 and 6 had cases reviewed to measure performance on this outcome. Region 4 achieved 100% performance.
- During FY2010, regional performance ranged between 39% and 82%. Region 4 was the highest performer at 82% and consistently performs well on this outcome. Regions 1, 3, and 5 showed improvement during FY2010.
- Case review shows the main reasons cases were rated not achieved: (a) the child's health status was not documented, (b) the child's health and education status were not documented, and (c) the child's health status did not address dental care.
- In September 2010, the ISSP form was modified to identify the FamLink Education Plan as a required attachment. Staff received a refresher training during the October 2010 Policy Roll-Out Training.

ACTION PLAN

- Strengthen direction and resources for staff regarding info to include in the health and education section of the ISSP.
- Implement quality assurance review process for Area Administrator’s oversight of supervisor approval of ISSPs.
- Continue to implement the Medicaid Purchasing Administration Foster Well-Being Program to increase the identification and documentation of children’s health information in FamLink.
- Continue to conduct ongoing case reviews to identify and monitor state, regional, and local performance and address improvement needs.

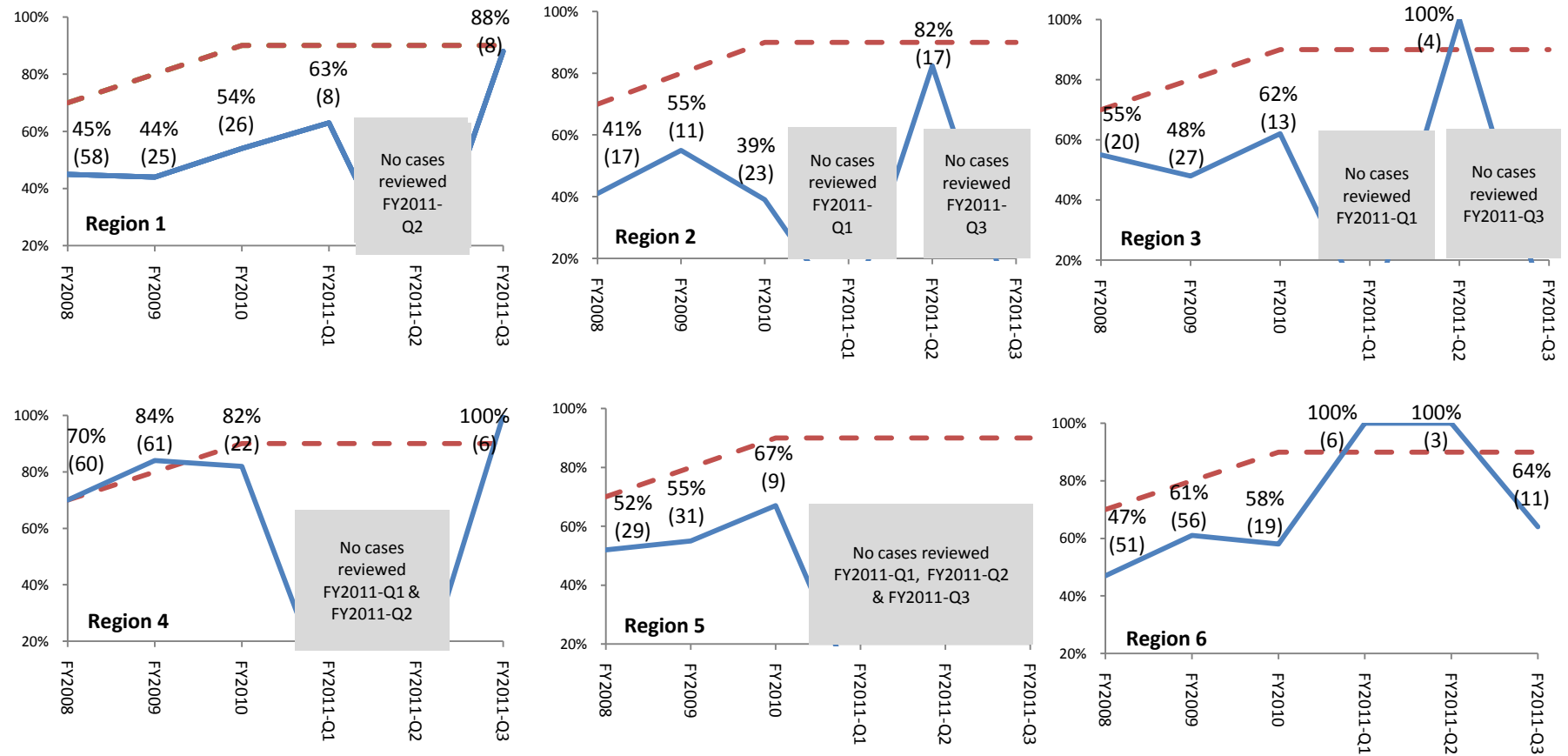

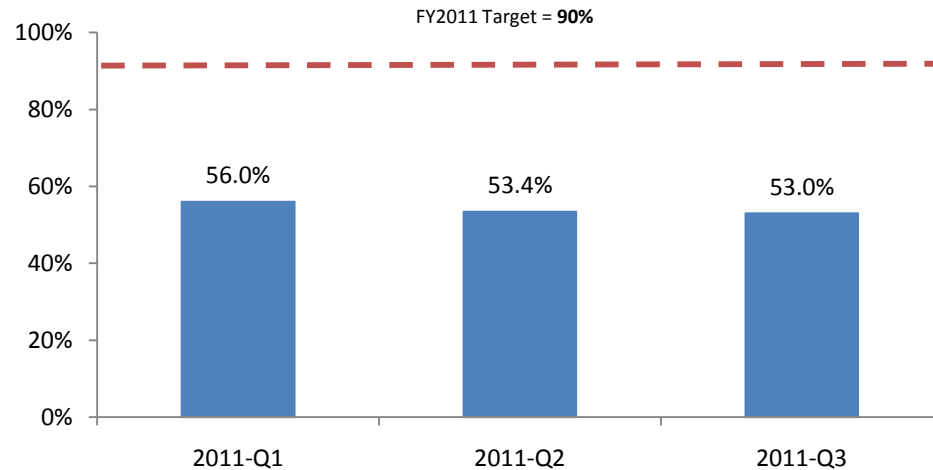

SUMMARY

- 53% of children and youth in out-of-home care for 12 months or longer during FY2011-Q3 have FamLink documentation showing they received a qualifying screening for mental health and substance abuse needs in the previous 12 months.
- This report is based solely on qualifying screening and treatment services documented in FamLink. The corresponding outcome measure uses additional data sources to identify qualifying screenings, including Regional Support Network (RSN) data and Medicaid billing and encounter records.
- Children and youth may have received a mental health or substance abuse screening, assessment or treatment service from an RSN, physician, community or private mental health or substance abuse treatment provider, and the information is not documented in FamLink in a manner that can be used for reporting purposes.
- Good health and emotional well-being increase the likelihood of developmental, social, and educational achievement.
- The Fostering Well-Being (FWB) Program is making great strides implementing strategies that will help improve performance on this outcome.
- CA social workers receive an annual automated FamLink reminder to schedule EPSDT exams for children on their caseload.

ACTION PLAN

- Continue to validate and refine the new FamLink Management Report.
- Continue to communicate practice expectations and FamLink documentation instructions.
- Continue to implement the FWB Program, including providing caregiver's brochures about EPSDT exams, developing annual notification letter for caregivers to schedule the EPSDT exam, and communication with healthcare providers regarding information and billing instructions for EPSDT exams.

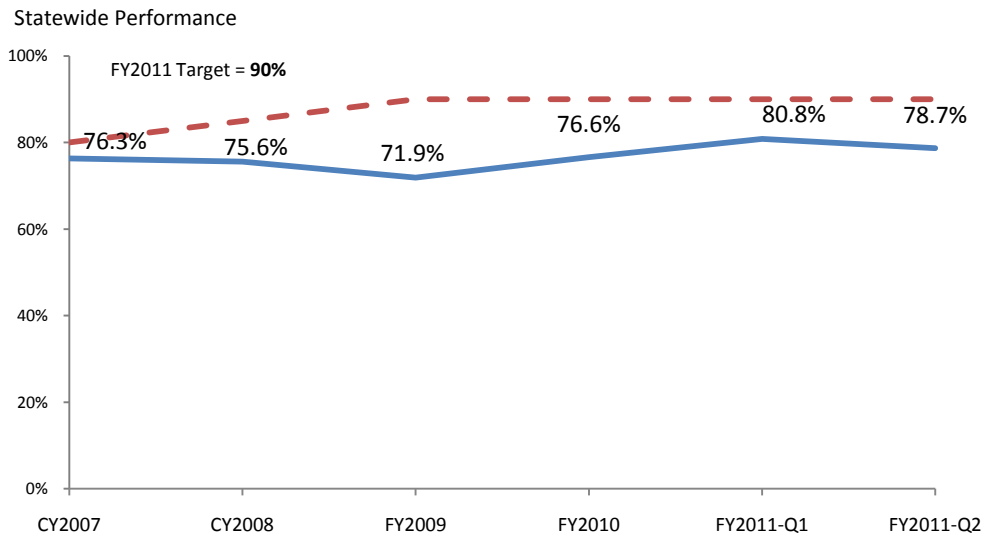

SUMMARY

- FY2011-Q2 performance was 78.7% for Foster Parents reporting they received adequate support for their roles and responsibilities.
- Performance has remained relatively stable since CY2007 (76.3%).
- Regional performance is not calculated in quarterly reports.
- Compliance is an aggregate of caregiver responses to seven questions. FY2010 and FY2011 quarterly performance for each question is included on page 14.
- To better support and engage foster parents, Children's Administration leadership has facilitated the following:
 - Increased organizational supports, such as hubs and support groups.
 - Engagement in ongoing collaboration with foster parent 1624 consultation teams.
 - Increased caregiver communication through the use of websites, monthly newsletter, and ListServ.
 - Communication with CA staff regarding practice expectations for working with caregivers.
 - In-service staff training by Dr. Denise Goodman, a national consultant in recruitment, training, support, and retention of caregivers.
 - Ongoing monthly random calls to foster parents to touch base.
- A statewide workgroup met for several months to develop a Caregiver Support Improvement Plan. The workgroup included foster parent, social worker, supervisor, relative caregiver and other CA staff representatives. The draft proposal is in the process of being finalized for review and feedback.

ACTION PLAN

- Continue to strengthen working relationship with caregivers and the spirit of partnership between CA staff and caregivers.
- Finalize and implement Caregiver Support Improvement Plan.
- Strengthen dissemination and use of foster parent survey results.

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Regional Trends



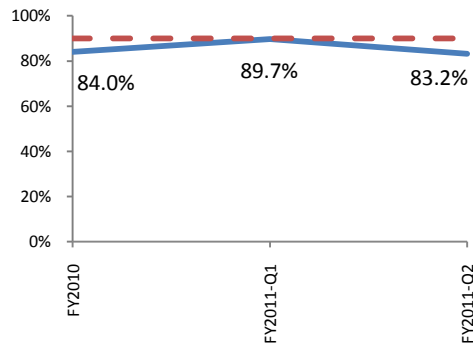
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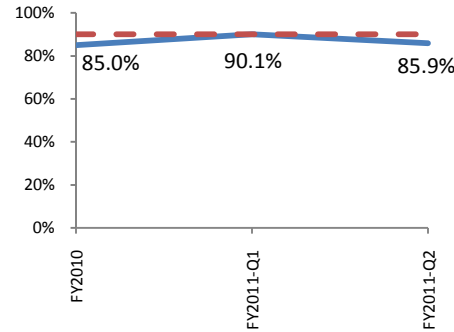
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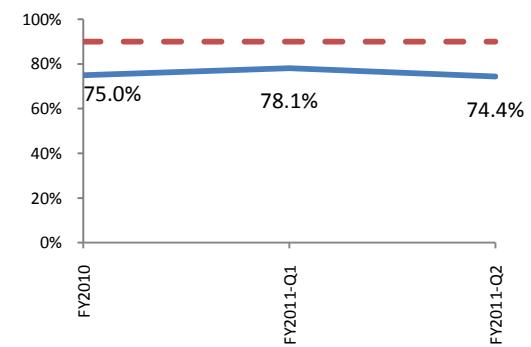
Timely Response to Crisis or Emergency



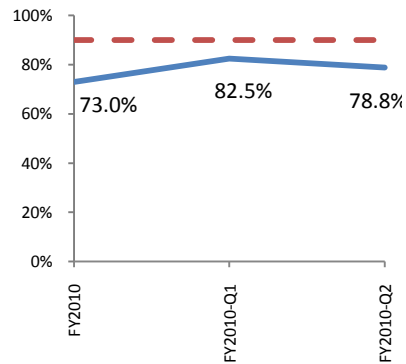

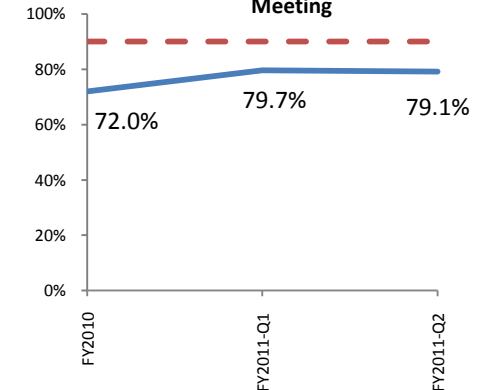

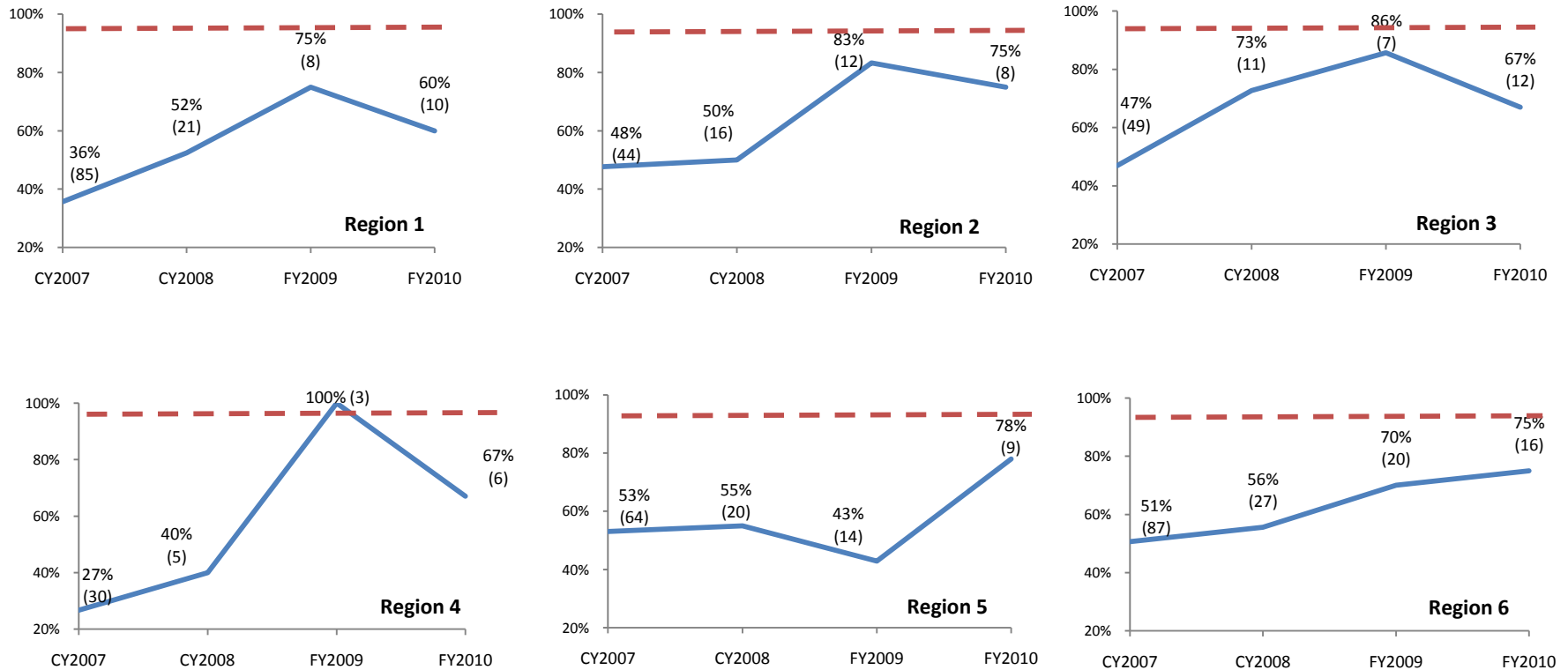

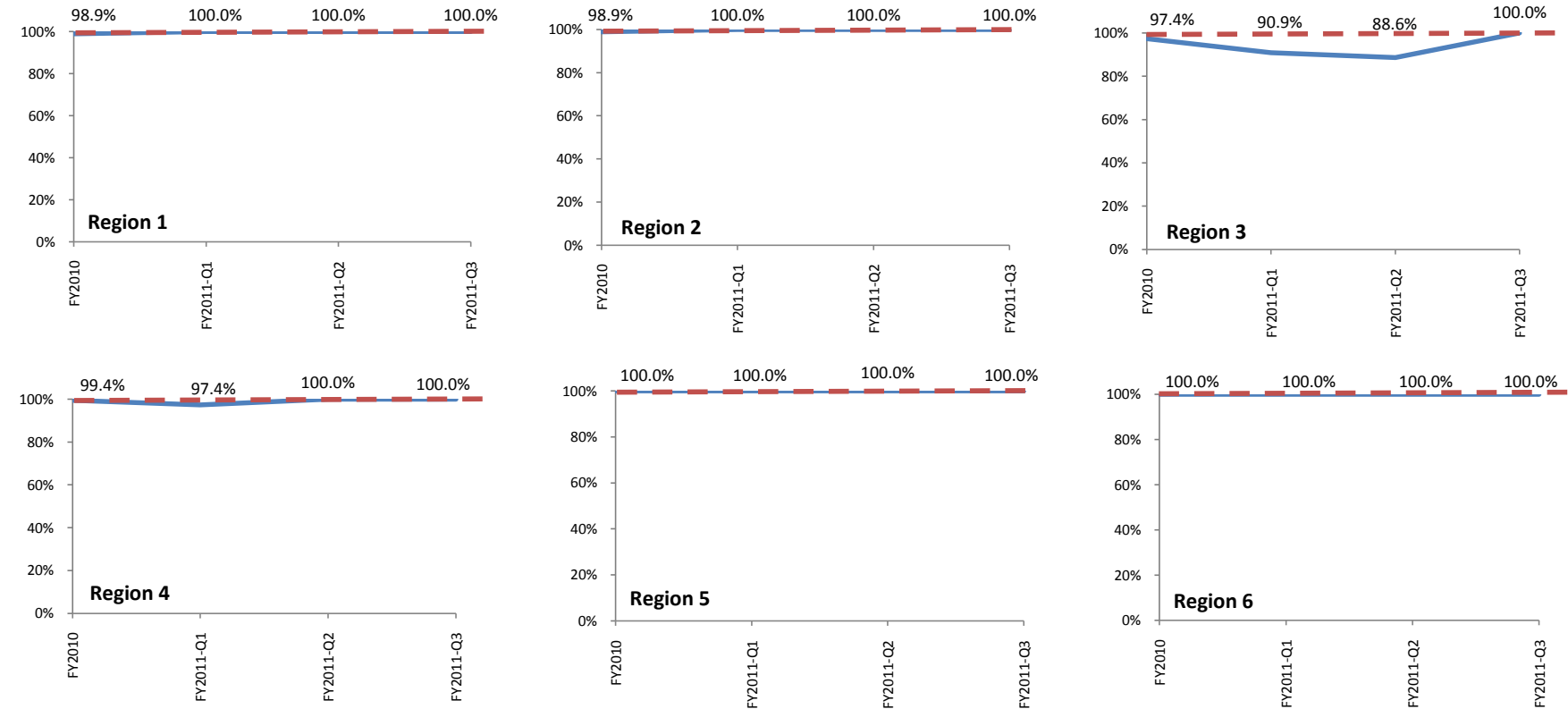

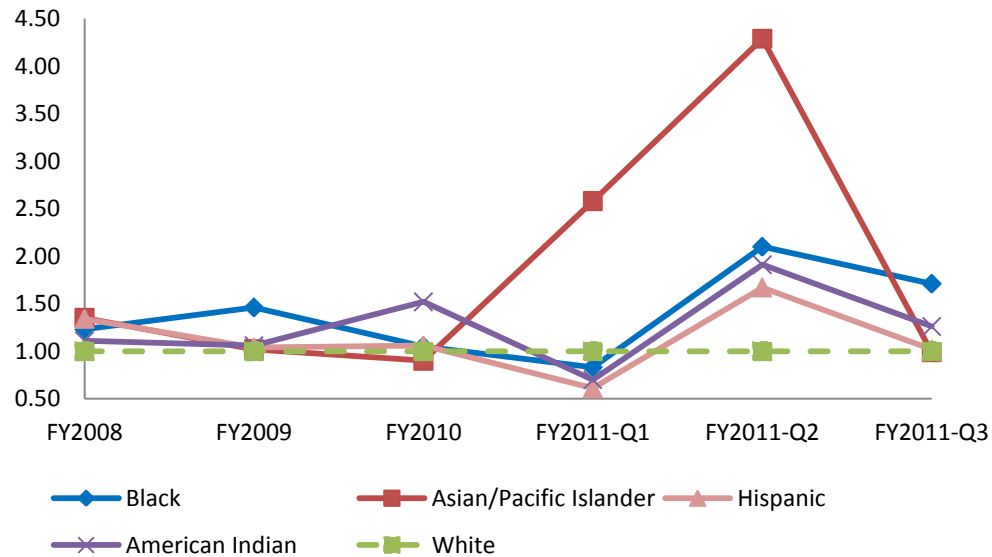

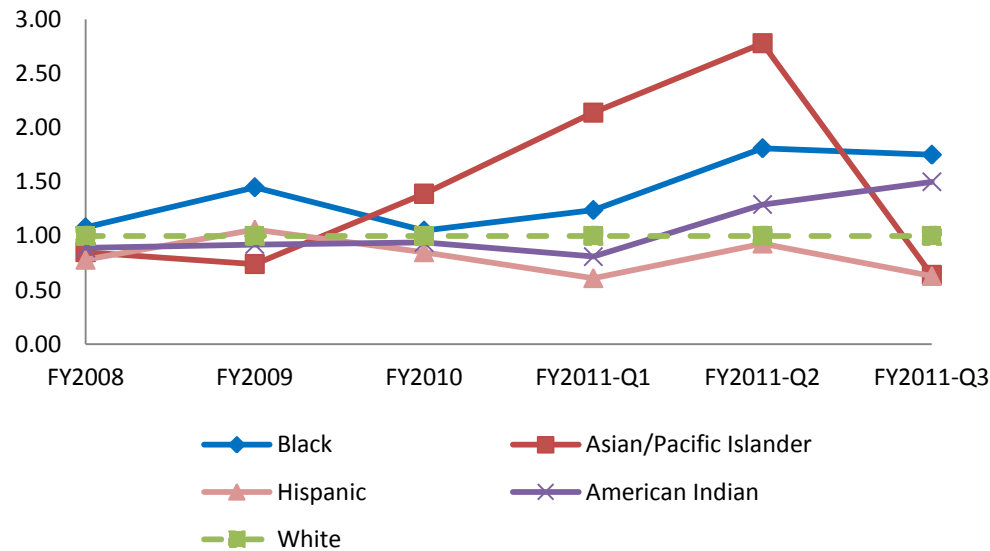

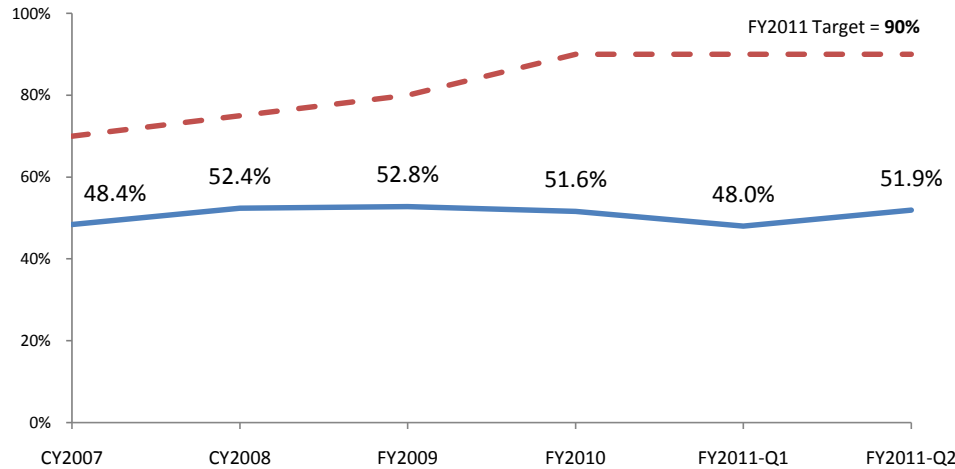

SUMMARY

- *This measure has changed over time preventing comparison of performance across time.*
- *During FY2011-Q2, caregivers reported approximately 52% of children had two or more monthly visits or contacts with at least one of their brothers or sisters.*
- *FY2011 quarterly performance is about the same as FY2010.*
- *Regional performance is not calculated in quarterly reports due to the complexity of the measure. Regional performance for FY2010 ranged between 48-59%. Region 3 was the highest performer.*
- *Licensed providers report greater frequency of sibling visits and contacts than unlicensed caregivers.*
- **Highlights of findings using FY2011-Q2 survey results showed the following based on information provided by caregivers:**
 - *Majority of children have a sibling not residing with them (55.7%).*
 - *Majority of siblings that reside elsewhere are half siblings (64.0%).*
 - *Majority of siblings residing elsewhere are age 5 to 17 years old (est. 51%).*
 - *9% of siblings residing elsewhere are >18 years and 21% are < 5 years.*
 - *Siblings residing elsewhere live with other foster parent (21%), mother/father (29%), and relatives (19%).*
 - *Primary reason caregivers report siblings are not having regular visits and contact include (in order of frequency): (a) siblings reside far apart, (b) visits are not coordinated by CA, (c) the child's age makes contact not possible, and (d) the sibling was adopted.*

ACTION PLAN

- **Continue to strengthen Family Team meeting practices to ensure discussion occurs regarding the value, plan, and progress to maintain sibling relationships when brothers and sisters are placed apart.**
- **Implement "Keeping Brothers and Sisters Connected" Tip and Support Tool for Social Workers and Caregivers**
- **Strengthen policy and practice expectations related to documenting sibling visits and contacts.**
- **Development of FamLink management report to assist regional and local office management with quality assurance.**

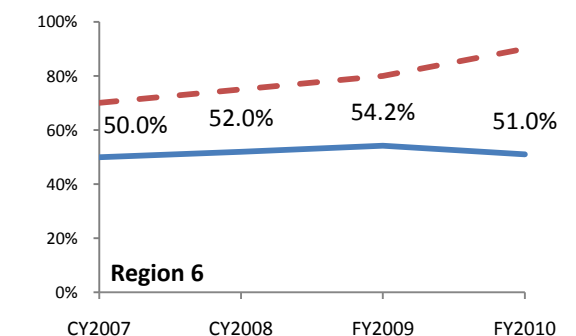
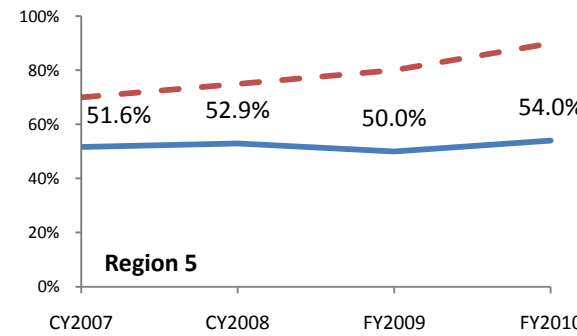
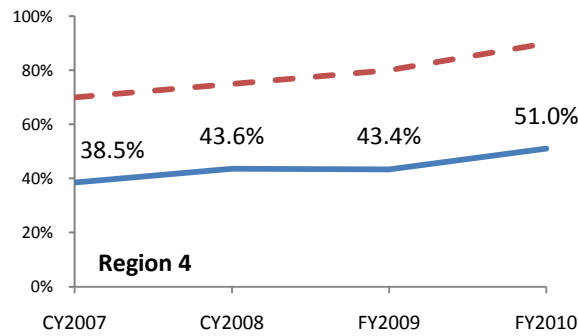
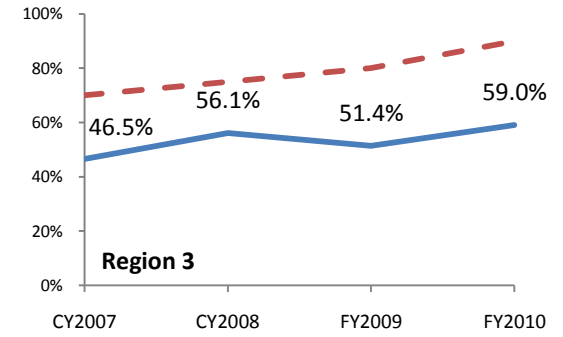
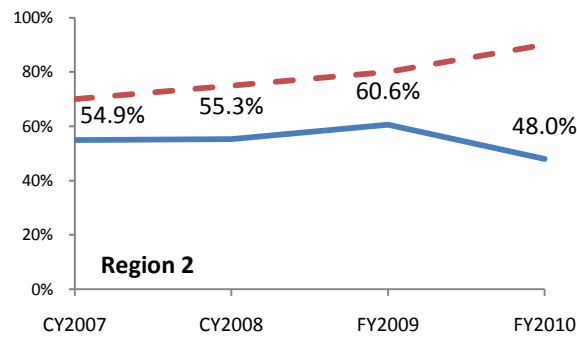
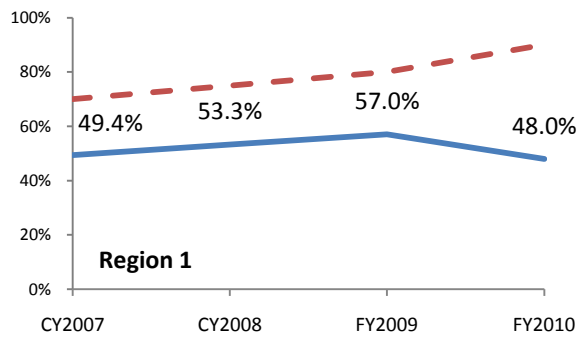

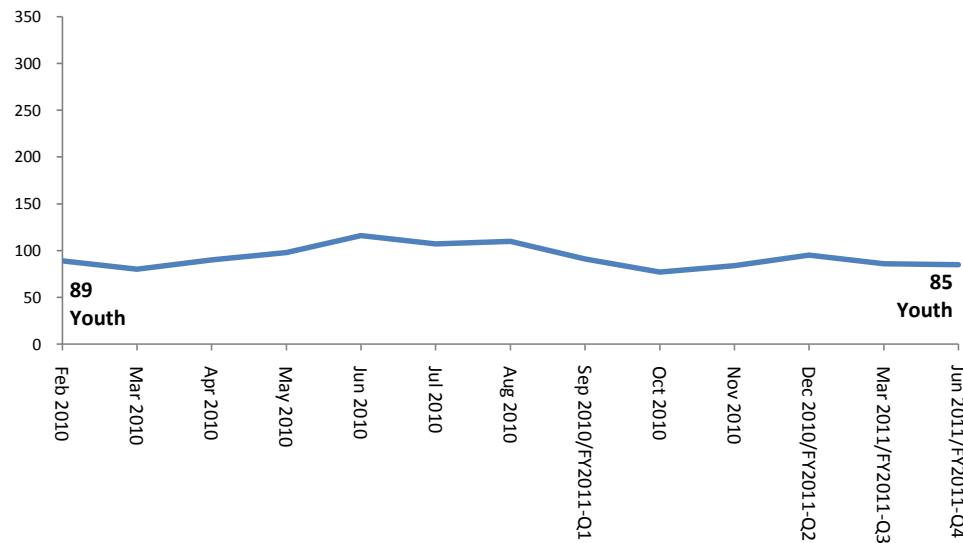

SUMMARY

- 85 youth were on runaway status in FY2011-Q4.
- Region 4 had the highest number of youth on the run in FY2011-Q4.
- A number of youth on runaway status in FY2011-Q4 were on their first run (21%, 18 youth). The goal is to intervene with these youth early to help prevent future runs. CA staff are taking a closer look at this population and current strategies making a difference with first time runners.
- A number of youth in FY2011-Q4 were frequent runners with more than 6 incidents of runaway status during their time in care (18%, 15 youth). CA staff are taking a closer look at this population as well to see if there are contributing factors to inform practice improvement work with youth who frequently run from care.
- Data showing the last placement setting prior to the youth being on runaway status indicates 30% are running from a foster/receiving home, 21% from a therapeutic or specialized placement setting, 13% from a relative caregiver and 4% are running from a Crisis Residential Center (CRC).
- Monthly quality assurance review activities are continuing to be implemented and strengthened as improvement needs are identified.

ACTION PLAN

- Continue to implement statewide and regional quality assurance review activities to identify and address improvement needs.
- Continue to identify and analyze potential factors associated with youth on runaway status.
- Complete development and implementation of new on-line FamLink Management Report.

Regional Trends (Count of Youth on Runaway Status On or Near Last Day of Month)



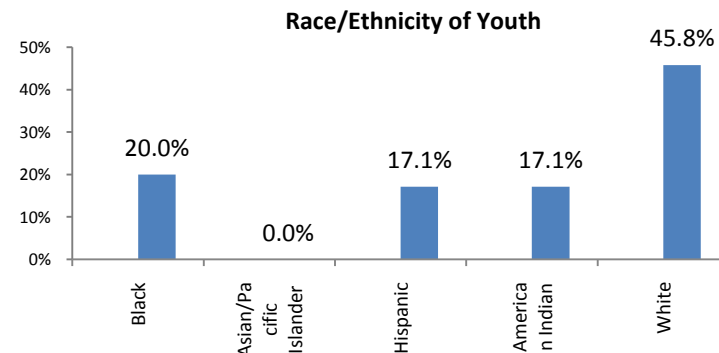
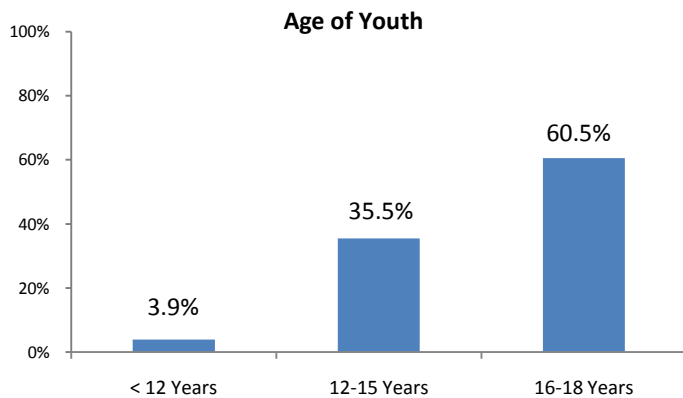
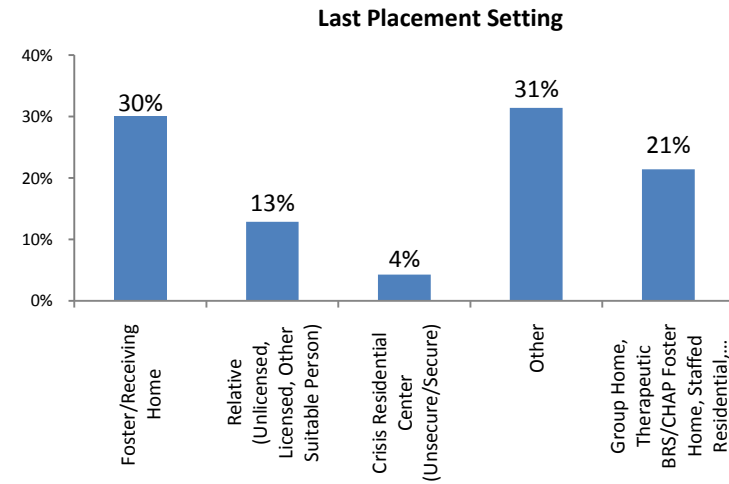
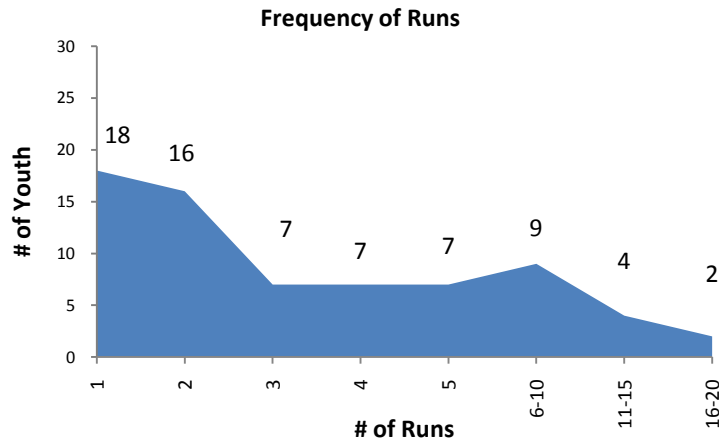
